

Who Can Participate?

The Poster contest is open to all Oklahoma County students in grades K-5 including students in public, private or home school.

Contest Divisions:

- Division K – Kindergarten
- Division 1 – First Grade
- Division II – Second Grade
- Division III – Third Grade
- Division IV – Fourth Grade
- Division V – Fifth Grade

Deadline:

Posters must be in the Conservation District office, located at 4850 N. Lincoln Blvd, Suite B, Oklahoma City, OK, by Thursday, September 24, 2020, 4:30 p.m.

Awards:

The Conservation District will provide awards for the top three winners in each division. First place will receive a trophy and gift certificate. Second and third place will receive a trophy.

**Local first place winners are eligible to compete in the OACD (Oklahoma Association of Conservation Districts) Area Poster Contest. Area winners will compete in the State Contest and State winners will be eligible for the NACD National Poster Contest and prizes. Visit www.nacdnet.org for more information.*

OKLAHOMA COUNTY CONSERVATION DISTRICT 2020 POSTER CONTEST



Rules

- Any media may be used to create a flat or two-dimensional effect (paint, crayon, colored pencil, markers, charcoal, stickers, paper or other materials) on poster board.
- **Poster size must be 14"x22" only or it will be disqualified.**
This is half a poster board. Wrong sizes will not be judged!
- Posters should be packaged so they **remain flat** when sent for judging.
- All posters must be created by an individual student rather than a team of students.
- The 2020 theme, **Where Would We BEE Without Pollinators** must be on your poster. (*Don't use any other title.*)
- Although **younger** students will most likely receive help in planning from parents or teachers, the District encourages students to do as much of the work as possible by themselves. Entries completed by students in their own handwriting and coloring will score better than those designed, drawn and colored by adult assistance.
- On the back of each poster, you must attach a contest entry form, and the following information must be listed:

Contest Division / Grade
Student's Name and Home Address
Student's School and School Address
Teacher's Name

Poster Evaluations:

Posters are evaluated on the following criteria:

- Conservation message (50 percent)
(Must use correct theme)
- Visual effectiveness (30 percent)
- Originality (10 percent) and
- Universal appeal (10 percent)

Designing a poster and researching the theme can give you a voice in your community on important conservation issues. Good posters tell important stories to present now and for future generations. Posters capture people's attention with a powerful graphic and inspire with a message to your community.

Tips For a Great Poster

- ◆ Research your topic
- ◆ Brainstorm ideas, make a list
- ◆ **Use only current theme 'Where Would We BEE Without Pollinators' as your title**
- ◆ **Use only the proper size poster**
- ◆ Don't use too many extra words
- ◆ **Make letters large enough to be easily read**
- ◆ Separate words enough to make them easily grasped
- ◆ Use a combination of words and illustrations
- ◆ Be neat as you can
- ◆ Use colors to get and hold attention
- ◆ Blend colors when using crayons or colored pencils
- ◆ Make sure poster is balanced
- ◆ A single, clearly illustrated message is more effective
- ◆ Do not use fluorescent posters
